Dear friends,

I once read somewhere that beauty is salvation. If we found beauty in and around us, we would survive and even strive in any circumstance. Somehow, during the current corona virus pandemic, I believe we gained the ability to find beauty more and more often. I am looking out the window, facing our backyard, where a fully bloomed Rose of Sharon fills the window like a still oil painting in a frame. They bloom in the morning and fold their faces in the dark. Their beauty is brief but gorgeous. Because of the pandemic, we were forced to slow down and we found beauty in many places, though it could be brief. Ironically, we also find ourselves struggling with more conflicts and more violence since this pandemic. First, it was about unsettling racial conflicts manifested in the violence against black sisters and brother and Asian immigrants. Acrossed the line of skin colors, people gathered everywhere and raised voices against the on-going racism. We find beauty and hope in those faces and voices. Then, it was gun violence. It happened in the Uvalde Elementary School, a grocery store in Buffalo, New York, a Jewish synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and then in Highland Park, Illinois. The sadness is so deep. We want to close our eyes to this tragedy. But if we close our eyes, we give up on the hope of finding beauty around us, though it may be hard and brief. There is no beauty in guns and weapons. We find beauty and hope in humanity, despite those faces that are marred with agony and sorrow for the innocent victims and their loved ones. Also, we console more and more young people who suffer with mental health issues in this environment of uncertainty and traumas. Recently, I read a report saying that depression in young people is mainly due to the traumatic events of their lives rather than a chemical imbalance in their brains. Somehow, we need to help them to find beauty and hope even in this time of uncertainty.

One of our young people organized a street demonstration against gun violence in Glenview. Since then, some people of our church decided to meet to discuss gun violence and find hope in and around us. In this Visitor, there is an article from Scott Daniels about the gathering. I hope you come and be a part of this dialog. We invite and welcome young people to this gathering and we will listen to them. I believe we will find beauty and hope in the midst of our searching and sharing. You are the beautiful people of God and I give thanks to God because of you.

Our New Neighbors/Refugees - Update

November 2021 we were contacted by Northbrook United Methodist Church asking if we could partner with them to help with newly arriving Afghan Refugees. GUMC agreed to do so. We were assigned four men. All had helped the U.S. military in one capacity or another and were evacuated on short notice when the U.S. Military pulled out of Afghanistan. Many of you were very helpful in helping us collect household supplies for them and other needs as became evident, TV's, computers, bikes, etc. Your generosity helped other refugees as well.

As an update of the four men in our charge for 6 months or more: Yones is doing very well. He speaks 3-4 languages and had excellent English before arriving here. He is enjoying his role with the Muslim Women's Resource Center as translator and in other capacities. Grazi Han went to Nebraska at the invitation of a friend and an offer of a good job there. Badshah has a job in Chicago and lives with several other refugees. (They are responsible for their own rent after 3 months so the more that can share with rent the better.) Hamid has a job, just got a driver's license, and is working very hard to learn English. Sharon from NUMC and Michel from GUMC work/tutor with him weekly via phone. His English is coming along very well. He is worried about his wife, children and parents in Afghanistan and continues to talk with his case worker here re: his immigration status. None of the four were from the recent earthquake area.

Thank you for helping these refugees and others to get settled in a new land, where everything is new to them. You helped more than you may ever realize. Thank you. Thank you.

Topic: The Proliferation of Firearms. What should we do about it?

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You have probably heard of the theory of "six degrees of separation". The theory is everyone in the world is no more than 6 handshakes away from being connected with everyone else. When watching the news reports of mass shootings in other cities, the events appeared far away. With work, one could eventually find someone close to the action, but it would be someone probably at the end of the "six degrees of separation". For many of us, the shooting in Highland Park changed all of that. Initially I didn't think I knew anyone close to the event. However, I recently discovered someone I know lives in Highland Park and knows someone that knows a person that was at the scene of the shooting. That's "two degrees of separation".

This last week, I found that a person sitting next to me in a class I am taking is a Highland Park shooting survivor. He was there with his wife and granddaughter. He was a close as you could get to the shooter. He saw bodies dropping around him. His granddaughter dove for the ground, his wife covered her, and he covered them both. He says the only reason he survived was by the grace of God the shooter was a bad at it. That is now "one degree of separation". The event was as close as you can get without being there.

It's scary. I worry it may only be only a matter of time until events become a very personal tragedy for someone in my family.

As Methodists, we are part of a long tradition of action. At the turn of the previous century, Methodists were responsible for the temperance movement. Since then, Methodists have participated in missions to promote the physical and spiritual health and welfare throughout the world. On a recent Sunday morning, Beth and Greg Peterson's daughter, Maddie, organized members into a protest to voice our opposition to the proliferation of firearms. We as a church need to continue our tradition of action and keep the momentum behind Maddie's initiative going!

On Monday, August 8 at 7:00PM in the Choir Room, members are invited to a discussion of what the role of our church should be in pursuit of this worthy goal. Discussion points will be 1) How do you feel about the proliferation of firearms, and 2) What steps, if any, should be taken to address the problem? It will only be a discussion, but it will be a start.


