Friends,

We are in the season of Lent. Our hearts are filled with hope for spring, renewal of life, and the new beginning of another chapter of our faith journey. We began this journey on Ash Wednesday with ashes on our foreheads, beautiful music, and silent prayers. We marked ourselves as sojourners. Now we need to keep moving on this journey. The sign on our foreheads separates us from the dramas of worldly power, success, and competitions. It reminds us that God is our Protector, Guider, and Savior. So, I hope we experience the peace that only God can give to us in this Lenten season. I invite you to this journey of peace. The first thing in the morning you may put a cross on your forehead with ash, oil, or water and say a prayer, "Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." If you want some ashes for this practice, please stop by my office. I will share some ashes with you.

During Lent rather than giving up something, I wrote something every morning with a cross on my forehead last year. Somedays I failed to write anything though I tried hard. But I will do it again this Lent: putting an ash cross on myself, saying a prayer, and writing a meditation, devotion, or poem. This year, I am willing to share it with you. Our faith journey is different from anything we pursue or achieve in the world. We are in the world but not of the world. We belong to God who renews the world continually. I hope and pray that we all experience God's renewal power and Spirit in this Lent. Thanks be to God!

As we approach Easter, lets reflect on the life of Jesus. His time of ministry has had the greatest resounding impact ever known, changing this world over the past 2000 years.

During the ministry of Jesus, we read that he and his disciples had no place to call home. As they went throughout the region, they would search for a "person of peace" to welcome them and create a space they could feel at home. Who are the "people of peace" in our day? What does it look like to embody this in the world around us?

It doesn't take long for us to think about God's call to welcome the stranger. The person who welcomes the stranger is a person of peace. Today, there are over 100 million people who are displaced from their homes, some of whom have found themselves arriving here in Chicagoland as a stranger in need of welcome.

GUMC Welcomes New Neighbors.

World Relief Chicagoland, (WR), the agency GUMC is working with to help refugees find a home and hope, arranged for some of the trained volunteers to meet our new family Sat. Feb. 18. We met and visited, with the aid of WR workers and translator, a delightful family of 4: Isaac, his wife, Mangala; son Sergio 11; and daughter Amelia, 9. They are from Angola and speak. Portuguese. World Relief found them and were able to sparsely furnish a 2-bedroom apt. in Chicago's West Rogers Park neighborhood. The children are enrolled in school and are learning English fairly quickly. Isaac and Mangala are in ESL classes. They cannot work for income until their asylee papers clear which can take up to 6 months. They receive a small daily living stipend. through WR and WR has secured them a lawyer to help them with their immigration process. Going forward, GUMC's volunteers will meet with the family at least weekly to help them acclimate to Chicago and the U.S., exercise their English, take them shopping and to doctor appointments, take them on outings, help them learn the CTA system, etc. They have a church home whose pastor is also from Angola so that is of some comfort for them. They are very, very grateful for the support and friendship of the GUMC members. At this point we know they need some more household items, so we'll bring them to the Rummage Sale!! That in itself will be a unique experience for them and we are sure it will be a fun one. Thank you for the donations you have already given to WR, they have been very helpful for many, many refugee families that have come to the Chicagoland area including Isaac's family. Please keep them and the visiting volunteers in your prayers. Thank you for all you do for others.





West with Giraffes by Lynda Rutledge

It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind

the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, *West with Giraffes* explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.
