



# The Visiton

### Friends,

I have a personal topic that I want to share with you. I am about to go on a pilgrimage with one of our members, Linda Duback. It is the Civil Right Pilgrimage organized by the Northern Illinois Conference. It is one of the efforts that the NIC offers to achieve their goal of anti-racism in the church. About Anti-Racism, I think, I have a tricky position as a pastor and as a member of a minority race in the United Methodist Church. I came to the USA as an immigrant following other family members in 1988 when I was 28 years old. When I married Chris in 2000, I decided to get citizenship releasing the hope that I may go back to Korea sometime. That was a good decision. Chris and I have been raising a family of three, trying to overcome the differences of races, personalities, cultures, languages, and upbringings. For that, I give a big credit to Chris who is a typical white, tall, midwestern man, who didn't have many experiences of race and racism.

Since the ordination in 1998, I have been appointed to five UMC churches in the NIC. All of them are cross-cultural appointments. Race is the main topic of my ministry and life. At one church someone called me "a cute and dynamic thing," rather than pastor. There were other experiences that were much worse than that. I learned and experienced many things about race and racism. In general, I learned, the racism in America is based on the history of the sin of slavery. That means black Americans have been bearing the weight of racism. Black Americans still show the way

to other civil right movements, such as immigrants' rights, women's rights, LGBTQ persons' rights, transgender persons' rights, and disability persons' rights. I believe we are indebted to black Americans' courage, wisdom, and perseverance.

Then, how do we understand and position other racism issues, such as, so called "illegal immigrants" from Central and South America, the poverty of Native-Americans, anti-Muslim violence, antisemitism, Asian hate, or homophobic legislations? Once I was asked why I don't do anything about Asian hate. That's where my tricky position on racism stands as a pastor. Personally, I have enough opinions on racism but as a pastor I don't want to lead our church from my perspectives. All I want to say is "let's hear the suffering person's stories." That might be a black mother who lost her son in violence. That might be a transgender person who can't have medical treatment. That might be a teenager who can't go to college because he/she is undocumented. I was slow to participate in, and introduce NIC's programs of antiracism to our church. But I believe the time has come. So, I invited Linda Duback to go on this Civil Right pilgrimage with me to learn more about racism and to lead the antiracism effort in our church. I hope Linda and I will be safe people and safe places for you when and where we gather to discuss and act on antiracism in the future. Thank you for listening to my story again!
