

sent one Wednesday, or have any questions, contact the church office at office@glenviewumc.org.



GLASS BLOWER OF MURANO by Marina Fiorato Venice, 1681. Glassblowing is the lifeblood of the Republic, and Venetian mirrors are more precious than gold. Jealously guarded by the murderous Council of Ten, the glassblowers of Murano are virtually imprisoned on their island in the lagoon. But the greatest of the artists, Corradino Manin, sells his methods and his soul to the Sun King, Louis XIV of France, to protect his secret daughter. In the present day his descendant, Leonora Manin, leaves an unhappy life in London to begin a new one as a glassblower in Venice. As she finds new life and love in her adoptive city, her fate becomes inextricably linked with that of her ancestor and the treacherous secrets of his life begin to come to light.

How World Relief Gets Their Immigrants and Refugees for <u>Visitor</u>– February 2024

You've heard in worship and mission reports about World Relief and all it does for migrants and asylum seekers coming to the U.S. Have you wondered how World Relief links to those refugees, migrants, and asylum seekers? Around the country and in Chicago they connect in three ways:

1) The U.S. State Department notifies World Relief that a person (or people) will arrive in Chicago on a particular date and time. From there World Relief meets the new-comers – usually at the airport – and begins their normal protocol of services.

2) Refugees come on humanitarian grounds often from Afghanistan or Ukraine. They are usually sponsored by an individual or a group such as a church. But World Relief remains connected and involved with the refugees and immigrants and their sponsors.

3) Migrants just arrive in Chicago from the southern border on busses or an occasional plane. City case managers invite World Relief to go to the shelter or wherever migrants / asylum seekers are "living" to do an intake assessment to understand their case and begin to meet their needs. World Relief then begins their protocol for housing and meeting other needs to get the newly arrived safely settled.

For asylum seekers who require legal aid World Relief assesses their case, connects them to the World Relief Legal Clinic and goes with them to a hearing.

Indeed, World Relief does a lot! But how many people do they serve in the greater Chicago area from their three offices?

In 2013 they served 3,000 people. In 2023 they served 8,500 migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers. Chicago has received 27,000 asylum seekers and migrants from the U.S. southern border. World Relief is more than busy serving the immigrants and creating partnerships with the city and churches, individuals, and other organizations to meet the needs of so many in this incredible crisis.

We all saw on television the thousands trying to flee Afghanistan. Those who made it to the U.S. were often met by World Relief. We saw on the TV news the Ukranian families – often only the women and children – trying to escape the warring invasion from Russia. Those who came to the U.S. were frequently met by World Relief and many connected to the large Ukranian community in Chicago and the suburbs.

The numbers of people served by World Relief are staggering. Now with the new war in Gaza, we can only wonder what is happening in our world. We offer a prayer of thanks to God that World Relief exists and serves, that it partners with us of Glenview United Methodist church to make a difference to a few of the 27,000 migrants and asylum seekers escaping terrors we could not even imagine who are dropped on our Chicagoland doorstep.

The little boy stands on the beach covered with starfish washed up and left to die. He bends over and throws one starfish after another back into the ocean.

"There are too many starfish to save. You can't take rescue them all," says the skeptic.

"No, but I can make a difference for the ones I throw back in their water."
