I get paid twice a month with paper checks. That means I go to my bank twice a month. Chris tells me I don't need to go to the bank and can deposit checks using my phone. So I downloaded my bank's app on my phone, but I still go to the bank. I use their ATM machine which is inside the bank, not the drive through. I think I like to go to stabilized institutions, such as banks, libraries, and churches. Though my bank is a big national one, the local branch I go to has a friendly and welcoming neighborhood feel. Someone at the door says hello to me with a smile. People at the desk raise their head and look at me when I walk in. The cashiers at their desks pay attention to me when I walk directly to the ATM machine. I don't need a strangers' hello, smile, or attention when I deposit my pay checks, but I enjoy them and appreciate them. I feel like I am treated as a human, not a function.

Recently I attended a celebration worship of a merger of two churches. Even after the merger, the new church is small in terms of the number of membership and worship attendance. But I felt deep gratitude for that small church because of the enthusiasm, care, sincerity, and hope that the people of the church carry out. Sitting there, I was thinking where do most people experience the genuine feeling of being a human outside of the church. Yes, we humans don't need rituals, liturgy, and worship services to function, but without them there is no room for gratitude for life itself no matter how rich or poor we are.

We are connected as a congregation to the Northern Illinois Conference, as a Conference to the North Central Jurisdiction, as a jurisdiction to the five other jurisdictions of the U.S. and therefore to all the other United Methodist congregations in the U.S. and the world.

2024 General Conference Summary!

Slashed budget approved.

The denominational budget for 2025-2028 is \$373.4 million, a drop of 38 to 41 percent from the budget passed in 2016. COVID and disaffiliations had much to do with an anticipated drop in apportionment receipts. That budget is contingent on collection rates coming to 90 percent or more for the next two years. If giving is below that percentage, the budget bottom line will drop to \$353.6 million. Annual conferences will be asked to pay less to support denomination-wide ministries.

Deacons receive the option of presiding at the sacraments.

Deacons now may preside at the sacraments of communion and baptism without needing a bishop's permission. The new language in the Book of Discipline reads, "Deacons give leadership in the Church's life: in teaching and proclaiming the Word; in contributing to worship, in assisting the elders in administering the sacraments of baptism and Holy Communion, or in presiding at the celebration of the sacraments when contextually appropriate. For the sake of extending the mission and ministry of the church and offering the means of grace to the world, the deacon is authorized to preside at the celebration of the sacraments. Presiding at the celebration of the sacraments involves taking responsibility to lead the gathered community in celebrating baptism and Holy Communion."

Disaffiliations are done.

General Conference firmly closed the door on church disaffiliations by repealing Disciplinary paragraph 2553. That provision, introduced at the 2019 special session of General Conference, gave churches a way to leave the denomination with their property and after fulfilling annual conference obligations "for reasons of conscience." The option ended on Dec. 31, 2023, and delegates agreed not to reopen it. A separate petition passed later encourages conferences to devise policies for welcoming back those churches who had disaffiliated but later changed their minds.

Ordination and wedding ban revoked.

The most remarkable act of General Conference so far this week was the delegates' removal of prohibitions related to LGBTQ people. In one vote, General Conference lifted the ban against the ordination of "self-avowed, practicing homosexuals," protected the rights of clergy or churches who chose (or chose not to) officiate or host same-sex weddings, and urged bishops to pursue inclusivity of gender, race, ethnicity, age, people with disabilities, sexual orientation, and economic condition in naming representatives to ecumenical organizations. Striking the ban on same-sex weddings. Striking performing a same-sex wedding and being an LGTBQ+ clergy from the list of chargeable offenses. Creating a smoother, shorter process for people to regain clergy credentials after having lost them in church trials and proceedings related to our history of LGBTQ+ discrimination.

These three decisions required only one vote because these proposed legislative items ("petitions") were bundled into a calendar item, allowing delegates to vote on all of them at once. The joy these decisions made filled the convention center with cheers, shouts, and sobs. Many marched to a fountain outside of the building and sang together. Regionalization plan now just needs ratification. The last legislative item needed for the regionalization plan passed today. Next, members of annual conference sessions will vote on a constitutional amendment that make the plan possible. Two-thirds of all of these votes are needed to ratify the amendment. Some annual conferences may vote on it this year.


