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Dear friends,

I want to tell you the story of one of my favorite stories in *The Bible*. As you know *The Bible* is filled with stories, both good and bad, beautiful and ugly, comforting and scary, and hopeful and fearful. Even in one story there are both good and bad or comforting and scary parts together. So, people say that the stories of *The Bible* are like mirrors that we look our reflections both beautiful and ugly. And some people say they are like windows, opening views to see beyond our human existence, the Divine. Whatever the reasons, I love the stories of *The Bible*.

My favorite story goes like this: One of the two sons of Isaac, Jacob, ran away from home to avoid an angry father and brother to his uncle's house. I can related to this story as it is a similar situation that my friend is going through. She is housing and taking care of her niece who is queer. Her father was angry at her and her mother told her to leave home and stay with her aunt. My friend tries to figure out what she should do in this situation and her niece tries to figure out how to make a future without her parents' support.

Jacob's uncle was not a fair man and didn't deal with him well. He exploited Jacob's labor as his sheep keeper. And Jacob counter exploited his uncle. It is not a holy or beautiful story. Jacob married his uncle's two daughters and their two maids and had lots of children from four wives. One night he decided to run away from his uncle with his family, including their servants and animals, and go back home.

When they arrived at Jabbok River, he knew that he had to face his brother who might still be angry at him. He knew it might be a life-or-death moment, not only for him but for his family. He tried his best to be witty and smart, arranging his family members from the least important to him to the most important. Also, he prepared many gifts for his brother. He did everything he could think of. Then, what did he do? He wrestled with God's angel at the bank of Jabbok River. He was not sitting and fantasizing his brother's reactions in fear and anxiety. He knew he needed to face God before he faced his brother. So, he wrested with God's angel at a riverbank from dusk to dawn.

Is it beautiful and holy to you or fearful and scary to wrestle with God's angel? I am not sure. I just hope that I don't give up the wrestle. And Jacob didn't give up. He was holding onto him, God's angel, until the daybreak.

"Our" Fire Departments Serve So Many!

Do you notice these license plates between the end of April and June every year? Only 200 are sold each year and they go fast among firefighters! The fee from the plates goes to "Camp I Am Me" supported by the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance.



Camp I Am Me in Ingleside, Illinois brings children together every June who have been traumatized by being burned from a house fire or other kinds of tragedies. The children know the firefighters are their special friends and the firefighters feel the same about the children.

"Our" fire fighters from Glenview and Niles not only gave us their fire truck and ambulance bound for a village without the resource, but they participate with many other departments in giving the children a memorable week. At the end of the week, a fire engine from many Illinois departments go to the camp and forms the longest line of fire engines the children have probably ever seen. They do not just drive by the campers but they let the children climb into the trucks and feel themselves a fire fighter. We thank a Glencoe part-time firefighter for telling us about **Camp I Am Me** and about our departments' participation. And we're glad to discover what those unusual license plates mean.


